


Venue - Duluth Entertainment Convention Center

Keynote: Digging Deep: What is our role as responders?

Jonathan Bundt, MA - President Masa Consulting

Jonathan Bundt has worked in the behavioral science and law enforcement field for almost 30 years, specializing in disaster and crisis response. In the mid-1980s he served in the Israeli Defense Forces and then as a Chief Inspector

with the Israeli National Police-Border Patrol Division. There he was part of the elite anti-terrorism hostage rescue unit, Yamam. Following that, he became a trainer in the national anti-terrorism school and worked in the behavioral science unit. He then returned to the U.S. for graduate studies in psychology. He serves as the behavioral health disaster coordinator for Metro region (MN), is a member of MN-1 Disaster Medical Assistance Team (DMAT) and is a certified emergency manager in Minnesota. Jonathan also serves as the lead trainer and coordinator for 3Echo, a Hostile Event Response Program designed to save the lives in the first 30 minutes of a hostile event through coordinated, multidisciplinary response.

Most of us work in planning, prevention, response, and mitigation on a daily basis, but beyond those key elements we must focus on both the people we are serving and the people we are serving with during a response. This session will offer a light-hearted yet practical approach to balancing preparedness and response skill sets. In addition, this session will examine several key attributes that will make a difference during an event or emergency.

Nancy Beers - Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota Drew Digby, MA - Carlton County

Nancy Beers Director of Disaster Services and Camp Noah Nancy Beers has been the Director of Disaster Services and Camp Noah for Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota since 2010. She has many years of disaster case management and community advocacy for long-term disaster recovery. Nancy has testified at the National Commission on Children in Disaster, presented at the National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) conference, and continues to speak across the country as an advocate for disaster preparedness and recovery programming for children and families.

Drew Digby is the Special Projects and Long Term Recovery Manager for Carlton County, and assigned to coordinate the individual and family recovery from the June 2012 Northland Flash Floods across the entire flood region. In addition, he is a member of the City of Duluth Planning Commission. He has a bachelor's degree from the University of California at Berkeley in religious studies and a master's degree in history from the University of Chicago

Session participants will gain a broader understanding the stages of disaster recovery and the challenges with each stage. They will be able to answer the recovery questions such as who does what, when and why? Finally, participants will be provided further information in regards to what has happened in the region since the flooding disaster in the summer of 2012 and what are challenges lie ahead.

Chad Priest, RN, MSN, JD - CEO MESH, Inc

Chad Priest is the Chief Executive Officer at MESH, Inc. Drawing upon his clinical, military, legal and policy experience, Chad works with coalition members and stakeholders to enable healthcare providers to effectively respond to emergency events and remain viable through recovery.



Prior to joining MESH Chad was an attorney at the law firm of Baker & Daniels practicing public health and healthcare law in the Indianapolis and Washington, D.C. offices. While at Baker & Daniels Chad represented a variety of health care entities, including HMOs, Medicaid MCOs, PHOs, ambulatory surgical centers, comprehensive rehabilitation centers, physicians, nonprofit health care grant agencies and foundations, long-term care facilities, hospitals, provider networks and public health organizations. Utilizing his background in healthcare and emergency preparedness, he provided specialized counseling to clients on public health related matters. He also worked with health care and other social service clients on advocacy, public policy and legislative matters at the state and local level.

Room 202: Mass Evacuation / Mass Care

Grea Hankkio & Dennis Brescacin

In 2011, Northwestern Ontario faced the worst Forest Fire season in over 50 years. With hundreds of Fires threatening multiple remote communities, thousands of people required immediate evacuation. The City of Thunder Bay not only received and sheltered hundreds of evacuees, they also acted as a Transportation Hub moving almost 3000 people in 4 days to other communities in Ontario. Greg and Dennis will share their experience and the eleventh hour planning they were faced with and what they did to deal with this situation.

Room 203: Risk Communications: Live in Five – Lights, Camera, Action (Session 1/2) Cathy Clark & Julie Anderson

Participants will deliver key messages as part of an expanding disaster event with intense media interest. This session is for anyone designated as a spokesperson, public information officer, or handles public information duties. You will practice how to present key messages in a one-on-one interview plus learn how to speak with one voice at a news conference or briefing.

Room 204: Functional Needs Toolkit – A guide for planners

The Functional Needs Toolkit was designed to help planners engage and plan with those who live with functional needs. Good planning requires that planning occur with understanding the facts about the audience remove myths or perceived truths, and openly engage in what the realities are about the preparedness process. By following steps and resources in the toolkit the planner will be able to begin planning in a collaborative fashion using a "whole community approach".

Room 205: Vigilant Guard 15 (VG15) Full Scale Exercise Overview

Jono Anzalone, MS, CEM - Director of Government Operation

American Red Cross

Prior to re-joining the American Red Cross, Jono was the Regional Voluntary Agency Liaison at FEMA Region VII with responsibilities for coordinating with voluntary organizations active in disaster and FEMA Mass Care and Emergency programs in Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri. Since 1997, Jono has been a member of the American Red Cross Disaster Service Human Resource (DSHR) system. His numerous

disaster deployments include a number of national and international disaster assignments including being detailed to the United States Agency on International Development (USAID) during the 2010 Haiti Earthquake and assigned to their Response Management Team to lead the agencies donations management activity. Jono also has served as an adjunct faculty member for the University of Nebraska.

Jono graduated from Creighton University with a BA in Political Science and from the University of Nebraska with an MS in Economics and has earned the International Association of Emergency Management Certified Emergency Manager (CEM®) credential.

This keynote session will provide an overview of the whole community approach and its application both locally and nationally. It will examine how voluntary, faith based and community based organizations provide value to the emergency management team and provide strategies for their engagement in disaster planning and preparedness.
